

# St. Colman's Parish 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of Christmas 4<sup>th</sup> /5<sup>th</sup> January 2025

## Because you never know what's going to happen next.

A survey was made among school children asking them why they enjoyed reading Harry Potter novels and watching Harry Potter movies. The most common answer was, "Because you never know what's going to happen next!" This same sense of suspense and surprise prompted us to watch the seven episodes of the Star War movies. The same curiosity encouraged the great explorers like Marco Polo and Christopher Columbus to make risky and adventurous journeys, and today prompts adults to watch the James Bond films. — It is this same curiosity which led the Magi to follow the star of Bethlehem, a suspenseful journey because the Magi never knew what road the Spirit of God was going to take them down next. This week's Scripture readings invite us to have the same curiosity explorers and movie fans have, so that we may discover the "epiphany," (manifestation; Self-revelation), of our God in every person and every event, everywhere.

Like the Magi, let us offer to Jesus God's Own gifts to us on this feast of Epiphany. (a) The first gift might be <u>friendship with God</u>. After all, the whole point of Christmas is that God's Son became one of us to redeem us and call us friends. God desires our friendship in the form of wholehearted love and devotion. (b) A second gift might be altruistic, genuine <u>friendship with others</u>. This kind of friendship can be costly, for the price it exacts is vulnerability and openness to others. The Good News, however, is that, in offering friendship to others, we will receive back many blessings. (c) A third gift might be the <u>gift of reconciliation</u>. This gift repairs damaged relationships. It requires honesty, humility, recognition of our own part in the damage done by our sins to those around, understanding of others, forgiveness, and patience. (d) The fourth gift of this season is the <u>gift of peace</u>:

The Jubilee Year 2025: on the theme *Pilgrims of Hope*, officially commenced on Christmas Eve with the rite of Opening of the Holy Door of the Papal Basilica of Saint Peter by Pope Francis, who then presided over the celebration of the Night Mass of the Lord's Birth inside the Basilica. A Jubilee Year is celebrated every twenty-five years by the worldwide Church during which Catholics come together to rejoice in the faith. Over the Jubilee Year, we are encouraged to show mercy, forgive past wrongs, relieve debt, to spiritually rejuvenate, and be offered an opportunity to receive a plenary indulgence.

We may ask what is the 'hope' that Pope Francis calls us to, in other words what might it look like in the concrete circumstances of our own lives:

- Hope looks like forgiving when you want to stay angry. It looks like being kind to someone who doesn't deserve it, because you believe they can change.
- Hope looks like standing up for what is right, even when it costs you, because you believe justice matters.
- Hope is getting out of bed in the morning when you're struggling and depressed and uncertain believing just maybe that today might bring something new.
- Hope looks like parents raising children in a digital world, helping them to understand that their value goes beyond screens, and teaching them to find their identity in something deeper than "likes" and "comments" on social media.
- Hope looks like peacemakers who refuse to give up on reconciliation ... and so much more."
